Bench Tips by Brad Smith

MODIFYING PLIERS

Sometimes a few changes to your tools can significantly improve productivity and quality at the same time. Stock tools can be customized and improved using standard jewelry skills. Here's an example:

Making jump rings and weaving them into chainmail designs involves a lot of opening and closing of the rings. I typically use two square jaw pliers to do this, one for each hand. But sometimes the rings would slip out of the pliers, getting scratched, and requiring extra cleanup time. I solved the problem by forming a groove at the end of the jaw that would grasp the ring gently without scratching it. Use a triangular file or cutoff disk to cut the grooves about 1.5 mm back from the tip. Then to make the grooves round so they grasp the wire without distorting it, close the jaws and run a drill through the opening formed by the two rough grooves. Start with a small drill and follow up with a drill just slightly smaller than the wire size you want to grip. In my case that was 14 gauge wire, so I chose a #53 drill. Finally, polish the grooves with a rubberized disk.

THE GEMSTONE GARNET

Garnet is the birthstone for those who are born in January. The name "garnet" comes from the Latin granatus ("grain"), possibly a reference to the malum granatum ("pomegranate"), a plant with red seeds similar in shape, size, and color to some garnet crystals. Garnets come in a variety of colors, the most widely-known color of Garnet gemstones is dark red. When the term "Garnet" is used, it is usually connotative of the dark red form; other color Garnets are usually given more descriptive gemstone terms.

Garnet is not a single mineral, but describes a group of several closely related minerals. All species of garnets possess similar physical properties and crystal forms, but differ in chemical composition. The different species are almandine, andradite, pyrope, spessartine, uvarovite, and grossular (varieties of which are hessonite or cinnamon-stone and tsavorite),

Almandine, an iron alumina garnet, of deep red color, inclining to purple is the most common. Garnet. It is frequently cut as a cabochon, and is then known as carbuncle. Almandine garnet colors can range from pure red, reddish-orange and slightly purplish-red to dark, brownish-red. The unique deep red color of almandine is a direct result from the presence of iron.




Spessartine, like other garnets, forms rounded crystals with 12 rhombic or 24 trapezoidal faces or combinations of these and some other forms. This crystal habit is classic for the garnet minerals. Spessartine is formed in manganese rich metamorphic environments and in some granitic pegmatites. Spessartine is somewhat rare but occasionally will accompany other minerals and make a nice accessory mineral to an outstanding mineral specimen. Color is orange, reddish brown, brown, pink and yellow.



Andradite is the calcium iron garnet and forms in contact or regional metamorphic environments as does grossular, the calcium aluminum garnet. It is believed that these garnets form from the metamorphism of impure siliceous limestones. Andradite has many varieties based on color: Melanite is the black variety -Demantoid is the bright green variety and is sometimes cut as a gem - Topazolite is the yellow variety and is also occasionally cut as a gem.



Uvarovite is the only consistently green garnet and has a beautiful emerald-green color. As with the other calcium garnets (andradite and grossular), uvarovite is formed from the metamorphism of impure siliceous limestones and some other rocks that contain chromium. Mineral specimens of uvarovite are much sought after by collectors for outstanding brilliance and color.



Pyrope is the only member of the garnet family to always display red coloration in natural samples, and it is from this characteristic that it gets its name: from the Greek for *fire* and *eye*. Despite being less common than most garnets, it is a widely used gemstone with numerous alternative names, some of which are misnomers. Misnomers include *Colorado ruby*, *Arizona ruby*, *California ruby*, *Rocky Mountain ruby*, *Elie Ruby*, *Bohemian carbuncle*, and *Cape ruby*.



Grossular is the calcium aluminum garnet and forms in contact or regional metamorphic environments as does andradite the calcium iron garnet. It is believed that these garnets form from the metamorphism of impure siliceous limestones. Grossular has many color possibilities and is probably the most colorful of the garnets.

The orange variety is the most common and specimens of orange grossular crusts are prized by many collectors.

Hessonite is a red variety of grossular and is also sometimes used as a gem.
